

BOOK REVIEW

THIN AIR by Ann Cleeves

This author has become well known following the television series of "Vera" and the "Shetland Series" of stories featuring the detective Jimmy Perez.

"Thin Air" is one of the Shetland series of books and gives a wonderful picture of the Shetland Islands. The descriptions of the coast lines, the encroaching sea, the cliffs, the clifftop pathways and the dense fogs are beautifully portrayed and it's easy to imagine the boats and ferries that ply the coast as well as the planes that fly from various places.

Into this atmospheric setting, six University friends arrive from London to celebrate the marriage of one of them to a local Shetlander. Late on the wedding night, one of the visiting girls goes missing. Detectives Jimmy Perez and Willow Reeves investigate this disappearance into "Thin Air". Prior to this happening there were tales of a ghost of a girl who drowned in the 1920s. Alleged current sightings of the ghost are woven into the story.

The characters are all well portrayed, and come across to the reader as real people. Jimmy Perez is enigmatic, often separating himself from the others to think out the possibilities of the case. His immediate boss, Willow Reeves, is more impatient and wonders how Jimmy divines things so easily. Sandy Wilson, the other police person involved is keen for Jimmy's trust and spends time carrying out his jobs with care. The six friends from London are also well defined and their various personalities take shape over the time of the investigation.

The author provides us with a superb sense of place and its geographical isolation adds to the ominous feeling when a crime is committed. However, I found the denouement disappointing. Despite this it is an interesting and well-written book.

Recommended as a good read especially for a plane or train journey.





The Gift is Christmas

For the very first time in my life we are not giving presents this Christmas. It has happened without demur and a general sigh of relief. The kids have grown up, there are too many of us and actually we don't really want more stuff.

As a family we are considered very lucky. We don't have to read all that advice that life counsellors shell out about how to cope with the disjunctive rels who turn up for the festive season and make everybody's life anything but festive. A bit of the old Dimboola there.

But we, thanks to the example of our parents, just love being together. That's quite enough and this year we are over doing it as just about everyone will be there and much eating and drinking and chatting will flow. The chatting, the piss-taking, mockery and laughter just happens when we get together. For the oldies of us this is enormous fun but for those less resilient it gets a bit much and boring. I know they secretly laugh at us and wish for slightly less gratuitous exuberance.

Christmas has always been special for our family. Perhaps it is because we were brought up in the bush and in my case brought up our children in the bush. I remember when we moved from Paddington to Deepwater in the early seventies just before Christmas our six-year-old daughter was terrified Santa Claus would not find the place.

For many years the farm became the place of yuletide pilgrimage for the family as there was always lots of space and lots of things for kids to do. In addition, we had our own meat, eggs, milk and vegetables. At that time, I was playing the role of earth mother as there were not too many other challenges in such a remote spot.

The pantry bulged with bottled fruit and plum and blackberry jam. I made two loaves of stoneground wholemeal bread almost every day and they disappeared so fast it was really what they call in the economic sphere a zero-sum game. But conviction is all and the abundance was enchanting as well as exhausting. As we did not have a lot of money we compensated with food, fun and laughter and have always done that.

Not that our family Christmas dinners always went without drama. Of course there were the great faux pas, especially from in-laws who did not get the schtick. But these are stored away in the memory box to be revived with some laughter and disbelief over the years. I remember our daughter swallowing a silver sixpenny in the Christmas pudding and my father-in-law exaggerating the dire consequences. She ran hysterically screaming to her room and would not return to the table under any circumstances. Some of the other stories are unrepeatable.

I actually think Christmas is magic. As a child, I remember the pulsating eagerness to wake up on Christmas morning to open the pillow case full of Santa presents. It was the same with our kids. They would run into our bedroom with their sacks showing us with amazement what had suddenly appeared. It is an intrinsic need in humans, I think, to believe in magic, abundance and loving companionship. That's what Christmas is about to me and always has been, especially this year as we don't have to shop for presents.
